Coigach Heritage became a charity in 2022. Our first AGM was held in September followed by the now traditional Coigach Heritage Tea. Thanks to everyone who joined us for an interesting and busy afternoon. The trustees reported on:

- The new heritage displays designed for the old hall which will show Coigach history through crofting, fishing, the schools, church, emigration and much more. These are possible thanks to a substantial grant from Inspiring Scotland and will be installed over the winter.
- Working with local organisations to explore ways of getting a cafe up and running. After a workshop in January and a maildrop to all local households, a small group from Coigach Heritage, Visit Coigach and Coigach Community Development Group has continued to work on this difficult challenge, acutely aware of its importance to the community.
- The launch of the Lorg na Còigich project, the public sculpture to commemorate the Coigach struggles of the 1850s, designed by Will Maclean RSA and Marian Leven RSA. More information at https://www.coigachheritage.org/lorg-na-coigich
- Improvements to the hall to comply with public liability requirements, also temporary heritage exhibitions and exterior repainting, all thanks to volunteers.

Lorg na Còigich Memorial Sculpture

Fundraising for Lorg na Còigich got underway with a wonderful ceilidh at the end of July. Designed by internationally renowned artists and designers Will Maclean and Marian Leven, this will be a magnificent sculpture to commemorate the successful stand against evictions in the 1850s.

It will be one of the very few monuments in the country to mark the role of women and has attracted the attention of broadcaster Sally Magnusson. Her book 'Music in the Dark' describes the notorious Greenyards clearances where the women, who had been inspired by the success of the Coigach rebellion, were violently beaten. Sally gives a voice to the Coigach women leaders by reading out their names at her book events: Katie Macleod Campbell, Mary Macleod, Anna Bhan Mackenzie, Margaret Macleod and Catherine Stewart.

Did you know ...

In 1912 there was a Crofters and Fishermen's Appeal to the authorities about the condition of Badentarbet Pier. They complained it was unsafe for steamers and ships of any size, putting food supplies for people and stock at risk. Every householder and business from Rhegreanoch to Culnacraig signed the appeal, a pristine copy of which is in the Cromartie Estate records at the National Records of Scotland.

Highland Doctor's Adventure

Mr Gunn, medical officer of the Parish of Lochbroom, in response to a call to a keeper's house, some 25 miles distance, left, cycling, in the early morning.

He had not gone far when a strong wind blowing increased into a gale. Rain fell in the valleys; on the mountain tops snow fell, melting into sheets of cutting cold sleet. The keeper's house was reached after a trying enough journey.

But this was not all. Behind him in Ullapool Dr Gunn left a patient in a critical condition – so critical, indeed, that it was imperative that he should return that night. The patient's life hung on it, and this fact Dr Gunn never once lost sight of. To cycle back was impossible and to walk back by the road might be effort wasted. Time was everything in such a case.

But to return to the relief of his patient somehow Dr Gunn determined. Securing a reliable guide, he walked into the late evenings, and, in order to shorten the distance, took to the hills, and through the darkest night and wildest, he walked over the hillside known as the Coigach Rock. The rock rises sheer out of the sea, and is part of one of the precipitous spurs of Benmore Coigeach. There is no path and so dangerous was the route taken by Dr Gunn that night that only men of nerve would dare take it in day-light.

Only a few years ago a south-country man, attempted to cross this way during the day. He fell over a precipice and nearly lost his life. This heroic effort on behalf of a suffering fellow had called forth the heartiest appreciation of the community.

Old Shops of Coigach

Back in the days when the sea was the highway, there were many little shops around Coigach, supplied by steamers from Glasgow, Orkney and elsewhere which landed at Badentarbet. Kenneth Mackenzie had this shop at Badenscallie from the 1880s onwards. The Campbell family had a bigger shop at Dornie until the late 1950s and a weekly grocery van. The shop at 106 Achiltibuie was run by Rory Fraser and there was another small shop at Bella's Bothy, Achavraie.

A Little 'civil war' in the West

Extract from proceedings of Wick Chamber of Commerce August 1853


'As our fishing could not be carried on without an ample supply of hired men from the West Highlands, and as the supply had this season fallen far short of the demand, and many boat crews being at this moment short manned, it was natural that we should feel an interest in the welfare of a population whose assistance was indispensible to our own prosperity, and who spent a great proportion of their hard won earnings in this town.

It would appear that a little civil war was at present going on on the west coast of Ross-shire, betwixt the Marquis and Marchioness of Stafford and a portion of their tenantry. The civil force had been obstructed, military had been solicited from the government, and our quiet town was on the point of being involved in the fray, by an attempt made by the Fiscal of Ross-shire to arrest some of the Coigach men here while engaged at our fishing, and whilst surrounded by thousands of their comrades who feel keenly on the subject of clearance.

A scene of riot and outrage was only prevented by the judicious advice of our local authorities, who recommended the Fiscal to pocket the affront, until the men should return to their own homes.'

Coigach Cookbook

Coigeach Gaelic Choir were third in the contest for the Coronation 1937 Trophy. They come from the farthest north-west


Coigach Gaelic Choir 1977

Good Shot!

On the 17th of Sept 1900, George Macleod the gamekeeper at Culnacraig reports a daily game bag of 4 brace of grouse, 1 hare, 1 snipe, 1 partridge and 10 brown trout. On October 8th 1908 the monthly 'bag' was 135 grouse, 103 sea trout, 113 brown trout and 3 hares. In 1910 The Achiltibuie Inn (now the Summer Isles Hotel) was reporting 40 brace of grouse annually from Oscaig.
